The regular meeting of the Bowling Green City Council, held in the Simpson Building, Simpson Garden Park, 1291 Conneaut Avenue, Bowling Green, Ohio was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Council President Megan Newlove. The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance.

On roll call, Council Members Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Sorrells, and Zanfardino responded. Also present were Municipal Administrator John Fawcett, City Attorney Michael Marsh, Public Works Director Brian Craft, Assistant Utilities Director Paul Brock, Parks and Recreation Director Michelle Grigore and Planning Director Rick Ketzenbarger. Mayor John Quinn was not present. Acting Clerk Michelle Fitzgerald was in attendance in the absence of Clerk of Council Kay Scherreik.

Council Member Frost moved, McOmber seconded, to appoint Mark Hollenbaugh to the 1<sup>st</sup> Ward Council seat to fill the unexpired term of Gordy Heminger.

Council Member Zanfardino moved, Sorrells seconded, to appoint Jacob Redfern to the 1<sup>st</sup> Ward Council seat to fill the unexpired term of Gordy Heminger.

Council Member Frost suggested that both Hollenbaugh and Redfern introduce themselves to the audience. Both candidates addressed the audience and gave brief statements of their experience.

On the motion to appoint Hollenbaugh, Council Members Frost and McOmber voted yes while Council Members Newlove, Sorrells and Zanfardino voted no. Council President Newlove declared the motion defeated.

On the motion to appoint Redfern, Council Members Dunn, Newlove, Sorrells and Zanfardino voted yes, while Council Members Frost and McOmber voted no. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried. Mr. Redfern was sworn in by City Attorney Michael Marsh.

Council President Newlove declared the minutes of the meeting held August 3, 2009 approved as distributed.

#### **CORRESPONDENCE**

Acting Clerk noted that the Financial Budget Summary for the month of July was received from Finance Director Brian Bushong and distributed to Council prior the meeting.

Acting Clerk also noted that a listing of budget transfers for the month of August was received from Finance Director Brian Bushong and distributed to Council prior to the meeting for approval. Council Member Frost moved, Sorrells seconded, to approve the transfers as presented. On unanimous voice vote, Council President Newlove declared the motion carried. A copy of the transfers is attached and made a part of these minutes.

Acting Clerk read Resolution #3403 authorizing the City Attorney to petition the Board of County Commissioners of Wood County, Ohio, to change township lines, for first reading.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7922 providing supplemental appropriations of the current expenses and other expenditures of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, during the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2009 and ending December 31, 2009, for first reading.

Council Member Newlove moved, Sorrells seconded, to suspend the rules and give Ordinance #7922 its second and third reading. On roll call vote, Council Members Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, and McOmber voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and the rules suspended.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance # 7922 for second and third reading by number and title only.

Council Member Newlove moved, Sorrells seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7922. On roll call vote, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, and Newlove voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7922 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7923 authorizing the Municipal Administrator to advertise for bids and enter into a contract or contracts for the purchase of two replacement 10-foot stainless steel dump truck beds, and declaring an emergency, for first reading.

Council Member Newlove moved, Zanfardino seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7923. On roll call vote, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, and Zanfardino voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7923 adopted.

Council Member Frost set Ordinance #7924 for public hearing on October 5, 2009 at 7:45 p.m.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7925 amending and adopting Section 150.03 and 150.33 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, concerning agricultural animals, for first reading. Council Member Frost set Ordinance #7925 for public hearing on October 5, 2009 at 7:45 p.m.

Acting Clerk read Resolution #3401 transferring previously appropriated funds, for second reading.

Council Member Newlove moved, Redfern seconded, to suspend the rules and give Resolution #3401 its third reading. On roll call vote, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, and Dunn voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and the rules suspended.

Acting Clerk read Resolution #3401 for third reading by number and title only.

Council Member Newlove moved, Frost seconded, to adopt Resolution #3401. On roll call vote, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, and Frost voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Resolution #3401 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #3402 authoring the Finance Director to establish a Special Revenue Fund entitled "Community Development Block Grant-Recovery Fund" for the City of Bowling Green, Wood County, Ohio, for second reading.

Council Member Newlove moved, McOmber seconded, to suspend the rules and give Resolution #3402 its third reading. On roll call vote, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, and McOmber voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and the rules suspended

Acting Clerk read Resolution #3402 for third reading by number and title only.

Council Member Newlove moved, Frost seconded, to adopt Resolution #3402. On roll call vote, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, and Newlove voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Resolution #3402 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7918 providing supplemental appropriations for the current expenses and other expenditures of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio during the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2009 and ending December 31, 2009, for second reading.

Council Member Newlove moved, McOmber seconded, to suspend the rules and give Ordinance #7918 its third reading. On roll call vote Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, and Redfern voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and the rules suspended

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7918 for third reading by number and title only.

Council Member Newlove moved, Frost seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7918. On roll call vote, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, and Sorrells voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7918 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7919 authorizing the Municipal Administrator and the Utilities Director to sell obsolete items no longer needed for municipal purposes by public auction, and declaring an emergency, for second reading.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7920 authorizing the Utilities Director to advertise for bids and enter into a contract or contracts for the rehabilitation and/or replacement of substandard sewers as determined by the City Engineer, for second reading.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7921 authorizing the Utilities Director to advertise for bids and enter into a contract or contracts for the construction of approximately 1,700 lineal feet of a 12-inch waterline on East Wooster Street, for second reading.

Acting Clerk read Resolution #3400 authorizing the filing of (a) proposal(s) and/or (an) application(s) with the Ohio Department of Transportation for grants through the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Transit Administration (FTA), as authorized under Federal Transit Laws, as codified, 49 USC Section 5311 financial assistance for other than urbanized areas and funds available from the Ohio Public Transportation Grant Program, executing and contract/grant for the FY 2010 Ohio Elderly and Disabled Transit Fare Assistance Program, and executing and contract with the Ohio Department of Transportation upon grant proposal and/or application approval, for third reading.

Council Member Zanfardino moved, Sorrells seconded, to adopt Resolution #3400. On roll call vote, Council Members Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, and Zanfardino voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Resolution #3400 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7905 amending Section 153.01 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, relating to the definition of "discriminate" and "discrimination" and amending Section 153.02 in multiple sections to effectuate said new definition, for third reading.

Council Member Zanfardino moved, Dunn seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7905.

Council Member Sorrells began the discussion by saying that this ordinance is about someone's right to rent a place to live and that people in the majority take this right for granted. He said most people in the majority would not feel their ability to have a roof over their heads is a special privilege. He referred to one of the lobby visitors who asked where the list of protected classes end. He said in his opinion, as long as there are minorities who are struggling, the list never ends until no one experiences discrimination.

Council Member Zanfardino added that this ordinance is an elaboration of an ordinance that has been in existence in Bowling Green for many years. This ordinance only adds to the protected classes and gives people who feel they are discriminated against some legal recourse.

Council Member Frost said that the Ohio Civil Rights Commission has investigators that people can go to now at the state level if they feel they have experienced discrimination. This ordinance gives people a more local establishment to take a complaint to however it can be done now through the OCRC.

Sorrells said that the proponents of the ordinance want a way to resolve issues without going through litigation.

Frost indicated similar legislation was passed in Athens, Ohio. They made some similar additions to their fair housing ordinance with no issues.

McOmber said that many people in the community don't realize there are two ordinances. He said in his opinion, Ordinance #7905 is not as problematic as Ordinance #7906. In the employment area, at one time there was a law called *Employment at Will Rule* that allowed employers to terminate employees for any reason at all. These various protected classes are legislative exceptions to the *Employment at Will Rule*. It was a strong principal of law for many years and is not discarded lightly by many in the legal field. In terms of fair housing, the idea that we shouldn't deny housing to people in

these protected classes is easier for people to find agreement. McOmber further stated that the Mayor is also in favor of this ordinance. Additionally, he has not heard from many landlords which he believes means they are not particularly offended about the ordinance. McOmber suggested removing the protected classes of "political ideology" since he can see no reason for it being there other than that it was copied from the City of Bowling Green policy. It applies for City employees but not for housing in his opinion. Furthermore, if "political ideology" is left in, it could protect individuals such as white supremacists.

McOmber moved, Frost seconded to amend Ordinance #7905 to remove the classification of "political ideology" from the legislation. On roll call vote, Council Members Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, and Dunn voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and the ordinance amended to remove the classification "political ideology."

Council Member Newlove said that would with the additional protected classes, the City will be able to operate the same as it does now without creating additional bureaucracy.

Council Member Dunn noted that there is legislation at the state level that deals with the issues in Ordinance #7905 and #7906. The legislation is currently being delayed, and in his opinion "justice delayed is justice denied" and he would like to move forward on these issues. Dunn also said that he checked with City Attorney Michael Marsh who verified that should the legislation pass at the state level, the senior government's law prevails.

Council Member Redfern said that like the smoking ban, local communities are able to implement a course of action ahead of the state and set an example for the state to follow our lead.

On the motion to adopt Ordinance #7905 as amended, on roll call vote, Council Members McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, and Frost voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7905 adopted as amended.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7906 creating and adopting Chapter 39 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, concerning Unlawful Discrimination, for third reading.

Council Member Zanfardino moved, Dunn seconded to adopt Ordinance #7906.

Council Member Sorrells asked City Attorney Michael Marsh if all churches, religious schools, and religious bookstores are excluded. Mr. Marsh confirmed that any religious organization is excluded.

Council Member Frost said he is not convinced that Bowling Green as a municipality is the legislative body that needs to deal with discrimination issues when the Ohio Civil Rights Commission has the resources to be able to handle them. He further said that he was concerned with the current financial situation that additional manpower would be needed to handle any claims. He questioned whether people who have said they have been discriminated against have taken action using resources already available to them.

Council Member Zanfardino said that there is no protection at the state level for those with different sexual preferences. He said this legislation moves society forward.

Council Member McOmber said that of the individual protected classes, he questions the need for "political ideology" and "physical characteristics." He said that he feels that physical appearance is a qualification in some circumstances and that this legislation seems to say that taking physical appearance into consideration would be illegal.

Council Member Sorrells said he agrees with Mr. McOmber that political ideology phrase doesn't belong that in some cases, physical appearance can be an important consideration for some jobs, such as in sales. McOmber said that to the opponents of the legislation that say it is vague, the phrasing about physical appearance is one of the things that causes them to make that argument and when it comes up for a public

referendum, which he feels it probably will, it makes it less likely that the legislation will pass.

Council Member Redfern said he that he feels that people should be able to freely express their political ideology without fear of losing their job. Council Member Sorrells that unless someone can make a case regarding political ideology, he feels that Mr. McOmber is giving good guidance. He said that he feels that the legislation is heading for referendum and that the more vague the wording is, the less likely it is to survive.

Council President Newlove said that she doesn't think piercings, tattoos and hair coloring would fall under the category of "physical characteristics" since the legislation describes physical characteristics as those caused by "birth, accident, disease or natural physical development."

Council Member McOmber moved, Sorrells seconded, to amend Ordinance #7906 to remove the classification of "physical characteristics" from the legislation. On roll call vote, Council Members Newlove, Redfern, Zanfardino, Dunn, and Frost voted no. Council Members Sorrells and McOmber voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion defeated.

Council Member McOmber moved, Sorrells seconded, to amend Ordinance #7906 to remove the classification of "political ideology" from the legislation. On roll call vote, Council Members Zanfardino and Frost voted no. Council Members Redfern, Sorrells, Dunn, McOmber, and Newlove voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and the ordinance amended to remove the classification of "political ideology."

Council Member McOmber said that he thinks if the ordinance passes, it will eventually come up for a public vote. Proponents of the ordinance will have to convince people that the cause is the right one. Council Member Sorrells said that no matter how the vote goes, if one person who disagrees gets enough signatures, the issues will go for a vote. Council Member Zanfardino said that he doesn't think that a referendum is inevitable since it will have a negligible result for most people. Council Member Dunn cautioned that if the legislation goes for a referendum, it makes it very difficult to make minor changes and adjustments. He asked that people trust the process and give it time to work and allow Council to make changes if needed. Council Member Newlove agreed with Dunn and said that while she has questions about how the ordinance will work, she would like Council to have the chance to fix the ordinance as concerns arise.

McOmber said that the single biggest misconception about employment laws is that persons in protected classes have to be hired because they fall into a protected class or that they can't be terminated because they fall in a protected class. Employment laws never hire a business to hire someone who is unqualified or to continue to employ someone who is not doing the job.

On the motion to adopt Ordinance #7906, on roll call vote, Council Members Dunn, Newlove, McOmber, Redfern, Sorrells, and Zanfardino voted yes. Council Member Frost voted no. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7906 adopted as amended.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7913 amending and adopting Section 33.01 (Q) of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, relating to employment policies, for third reading.

Council President Newlove moved, Redfern seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7913. On roll call vote, Council Members Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, and Zanfardino voted yes. Council President declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7913 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance # 7914 amending and adopting Section 75.01 and Section 75.10 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, concerning bicycles, motorcycles and snowmobiles, for third reading.

Council Member Sorrells moved, McOmber seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7914. On roll call vote, Council Members Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, and Zanfardino voted yes. Council President declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7914 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7915 amending and adopting Section 98.03 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, regarding snow and ice covered sidewalks declared a nuisance, for third reading.

Council Member Sorrells moved, Dunn seconded to adopt Ordinance #7915. On roll call vote, Council Members Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino and Dunn voted yes. Council President declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7915 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7916 authorizing the Utilities Director to advertise for bids and enter a contract or contracts for the supplying of annual inventory requirements, vehicle fuel, underground and overhead lines insurance, and sale of scrap materials for calendar year 2010 for third reading.

Council Member McOmber moved, Zanfardino seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7916. On roll call vote, Council Members McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, and Frost voted yes. Council President declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7916 adopted.

Acting Clerk read Ordinance #7917 authorizing the Utilities Director to execute an amendment to the agreement with Corpro Companies for installation of additional sacrificial anodes on the 36-inch water transmission main, for third reading.

Council Member McOmber moved, Sorrells seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7917. On roll call vote Council Members Newlove, Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, and McOmber voted yes. Council President declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7917 adopted.


Council Member Frost moved, Sorrells seconded, to adopt Ordinance #7908 adopting Section 150.01 (E) of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, relating to requirement of financial guarantees for work in the public right-of-way. On roll call vote, Council Members Redfern, Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, and Newlove voted yes. Council President declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7908 adopted.

Council Member Frost moved, Zanfardino seconded, to adopt tabled Ordinance #7909 amending and adopting Section 150.03 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio, relating to definitions for electronic message boards. On roll call vote, Council Members Sorrells, Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, and Redfern voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7909 adopted.

Council Member Frost moved, Zanfardino seconded, to adopt tabled Ordinance #7910 amending and adopting the Zoning District Map of the City of Bowling Green, Ohio for 0.100 acres located behind 507 Harvest Lane from M-1 Light Industrial to R-2 Single Family Residential zoning. On roll call vote, Council Members Zanfardino, Dunn, Frost, McOmber, Newlove, Redfern, and Sorrells, voted yes. Council President Newlove declared the motion carried and Ordinance #7910 adopted.
